* For sickness and/or diarrhea it is essential to keep your child away from school **until 48 hours after the last episode of diarrhoea/vomiting**. These sorts of bugs can be transmitted very easily, particularly in school settings. We do encourage lots of hand-washing in school and would ask you to follow this at home, as well. Please remember if your child is unwell they will be much more comfortable at home with a parent or carer who can look after them much more closely than we can in school.

Covid-19 - Current advice is that this should be treated as any other respiratory infection. The following is from <u>People with symptoms of a respiratory infection including COVID-19 - GOV.UK</u> (www.gov.uk)

Symptoms of respiratory infections, including COVID-19

Respiratory infections can spread easily between people. It is important to be aware of symptoms so you can take action to reduce the risk of spreading your infection to other people. The symptoms of COVID-19 and other respiratory infections are very similar. It is not possible to tell if you have COVID-19, flu or another respiratory infection based on symptoms alone. Most people with COVID-19 and other respiratory infections will have a relatively mild illness, especially if they have been vaccinated.

If you have symptoms of a respiratory infection, such as COVID-19, and you have a high temperature or you do not feel well enough to go to work or carry out normal activities, you are advised to try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people.

Symptoms of COVID-19, flu and common respiratory infections include:

- continuous cough
- high temperature, fever or chills
- loss of, or change in, your normal sense of taste or smell
- shortness of breath
- unexplained tiredness, lack of energy
- muscle aches or pains that are not due to exercise
- not wanting to eat or not feeling hungry
- headache that is unusual or longer lasting than usual
- sore throat, stuffy or runny nose
- diarrhoea, feeling sick or being sick

News from Starling Class (Reception)

We enjoyed hearing what the children got up to over the bank holiday weekend. It sounds like you all had lots of fun.

We have continued our learning about plants and growing. Most of us predicted correctly that the lettuce plant that would grow the most was the plant we watered and in the sunlight. Some of us were surprised that the lettuce plant in the cupboard grew more than the lettuce plant out of the cupboard that we didn't water! Unfortunately our cress seeds are yet to grow. We keep watering them in the hope that they will.

In Phonics, we have continued learning Phase Four where we have been blending adjacent

consonants in words. This week we focussed on 'CCCVC'



words such as scrap, screen and scroll. In Maths we have begun learning about doubling. We used a song to help us remember our doubles. Can your child remember the dong? In Music we have been learning about Funk music. The children have been listening carefully to see if they can identify any of the instruments in the songs. We've heard saxophones, trombones, flutes and even bass guitars!

We continued our 'word collecting' work this week with the following words below to build on our ambitious vocabulary.




News from Robin Class (Year 1)

This week, we enjoyed 'potting on' our sunflower seedlings and everyone proudly carried their little pot home. Hopefully they all arrived safely and it was great to hear of children watering, taking care and planning where they are going plant their own sunflower. We really hope they grow nice and tall for you and bring a ray of sunshine to your gardens in the summer!

We have begun to look at diary-writing this week. Having read a couple of diaries – 'Diary of a Bean' and 'Elephant Diary' – the children were great at spotting features of this kind of text – specifically looking for a 'date', verbs in the past tense and having photographs with captions (and possibly diagrams with labels). All the children worked hard to write in the past tense about how we planted, watered, watched over, moved and cared for the sunflowers as they grew.

In Maths, we have book learning about arrays. The children are getting good at identifying the row and columns and using stem sentences to talk about what they can see. e.g.:



There are $\underline{3}$ rows of $\underline{5}$. There are $\underline{15}$ altogether.



There are <u>5</u> rows of <u>2</u> There are <u>10</u> altogether.

The carrot we started growing for our science investigation has started to grow green shoots, but so far we haven't seen any growth in either the onion or tomato slice. We will keep watching!

Having been able to observe the froglets and tiny frogs, a few have been rehomed to garden ponds this week. It has been super to see the children take such an interest in the changes that take place over time. The rest of the tadpoles will be rehomed this weekend or next to free up a bit of classroom space.

Phonics: This week, to tie in with our learning about using verbs in the past tense, all the children have been focussing on reading regular past tense verbs (words with an 'ed' ending), or thinking about how to spell these words correctly in our writing. Hopefully the children will



have remembered some actions to go with verbs – do ask them what they know!

News from Owl Class (Year 2)

We hope that you had a lovely long weekend, we loved hearing about the different things that the children got up to. We have had another exciting week in Owl Class and have loved playing on the field at lunchtimes.

In English, we are finalizing our description topic by doing some independent writing using all of the tools that we have been learning this term.

In Maths, we have continued with fractions, we are on the last bit now, focusing on unit fractions (where the numerator is one) and non-unit fractions (where the numerator is higher than one) and looking at three-quarters and how we can make a whole by counting up in fractions. Next week, we will be focusing on reasoning and applying all that we have learnt.

Our sewing projects are starting to take shape and we have been practising our needle work and attaching the different shapes on our designs. The children are really impressing Mrs Brown with their skills.

This week's spelling rule is words ending with 'le' that make the 'l' sound, all spelling sheets have gone home and it is great to see those that practiced last week.

In PSHE we have been talking about change, what changes happen as we grow up, what we can control and what is out of our control. (See attached photo)

This week, we have started making our final Torah. We have stained paper using teabags and have started to create our ornate Torah covers, it has been great to use a range of media to decorate the covers with symbols, patterns and colour.

Now that the weather is getting warmer please can we remind you to send your children in with summer hats and water bottles. Please make sure that jumpers/cardigans are labelled in case they need to take these off, we have had a lot of unnamed lost property, thankyou.

News from Peacock Class (Year 3)



The highlight of this week was our much anticipated Tudor day. It was really, really...fun

In the morning, we spent time learning about Tudor society and working practices. We became apprentices for Lord Patrick.

The lord of the manor told us, all about Anne Boleyn's arrest and upcoming trial. During the day the Lord was kind enough to keep us up to date with the news about her. As apprentices, we learnt the skills for a variety of common Tudor crafts and trades.

We made leather bookmarks by carefully hammering a sharp tool into leather to make a pattern. Limning (painting lockets) this needed to be very careful work as the miniatures, were really miniature!

Ink making and writing with quills, this was much harder than we first thought, as we needed to make the ink by grinding oak apples, resin and cuttlefish bones.

Soap making was very messy but smelt lovely as we chose sweet smelling herbs and spices to mix with soap flakes. We only needed to make a small amount, as we would only wash once a month. Sewing we carefully stitched our initials into fine cloth. Everyone was expected to be able to sew in Tudor times. Some women and girls were judged on how well they could sew.

Many of us visited the apothecary to cure simple ailments such as headaches and sore throats. Fortunately, no one had a bad injury and needing the barber's surgeon, we did not fancy the rusty old saw being used to amputate a cut leg!





News from Peacock Class (Year 3)

Once we had finished all these jobs, we came back to the classroom to find out a little more about the life of Henry the VIII and his wives. We were told about secret messages that some of the king's advisors and spies sent each other. They may have used invisible ink that became visible by using heat.

In the afternoon, we prepared for and then reenacted a Tudor feast. As part of this, we provided entertainment in the form of a play about George and the dragon, a selection of



songs, one was about the Tudor Rose. Some of us performed a walking line dance and some provided entertainment through juggling.

Special orange, Spanish Tudor wine was enjoyed along with cheese, bread and fruits.

An enjoyable, day was had by all.

Thank you to the parents who were able to help us during the day, we couldn't have managed without you.

News from Swift Class (Year 4)

In our Maths lessons on decimals, we have been focusing on the significance of place value and how decimals interconnect with our prior learning on fractions and later in the year, with percentages.

In Geography, we have been discovering more about the process behind global warming, particularly exploring the role of greenhouse gases in the enhanced green house effect. We have discussed how there are practical steps individuals can take to help reduce global warming such as recycling, opting for sustainable modes of transport like walking for short distances, and conserving energy by reducing heating usage at home.

Our Design and Technology lessons have revolved around the renowned Scottish architect and designer Charles Rennie Mackintosh. We've been inspired by Mackintosh's innovative designs, using them as a starting point to create our own model prototypes of chairs tailored to specific target audiences. If your child is particularly interested in his work, you can see an entire house he designed in Northampton!

With the SATs tests taking place next week, the children have been continuing to work hard this week in preparation. You should have received a letter, via Parent Mail, which discusses the arrangements for next week. Below is a timetable of when the various exams will take place.

In English lessons we have been working on various areas linked to grammar and punctuation, such as, synonyms and antonyms, active and passive, Standard English linked with formal and informal writing, hyphens for ambiguity as well as work on phrases and clauses. This week, in Maths, we have studied area, perimeter and volume of shapes, as well as looking at statistics and data. We also studied exam techniques for the reasoning questions and looked at ways to approach and answer them.
