Firstly, on behalf of the staff and children, I wanted to say a public "Thank you" to the amazing team of volunteers on our PTA who planned, organised, set up and ran our brilliant annual firework event last Saturday! The money the school community raise through PTA events is vital in enabling us to support the children in school. The PTA are thrilled to share that this year the profit from the fireworks event was approximately £3500! This will be going towards supporting the school with a project to improve our offer at break and lunch times (more information to follow).

Already this year, PTA have funded £3000 worth of books to support our new English curriculum, they have bought new class sets of atlases, funded sensory items introduced in our break-out space (The Canopy) and committed to paying for our class 'Achieve 100'. We have lots of other ideas too as to how you will see your fundraising used to positively impact the children.

This week we had a 'Festivals of Light Day' to enrich our RE curriculum in which each class across the school learnt about a different festival of light and created differing artwork to demonstrate their learning. Lots of this learning can be seen in the class entries this week.

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



This week we started our new topic of 'transport'. The children amazed us with their prior knowledge of transport, being able to name lots of modes of transport they already knew. Also this week we had our 'festival of light day' where we looked at Hanukkah. The children heard how this is a special festival for Jewish people. They learnt how Jewish people attend Synagogues to worship God and enjoyed making their own Hanukkiahs/Menorahs and Hanukkah cards.

This week we have learnt the following sounds: j, v, w and x as well as the 'harder to read and spell words' he, she and buses. In Maths, we have been looking at 2D shapes and their properties. Also this week we visited the library for the first time. This will now be a weekly occurrence on a Monday so if books are returned on a Monday, children are welcome to choose a new book.






News from Ash Class

A very busy first week back after half term in Ash class complete with a 'Festivals of Light' day, starting a new Maths unit, learning a new song in music and starting History lessons.

In Maths your child is learning about addition and subtraction for numbers up to 20. To support your child's learning at home rehearse number bonds to and within 10, number bonds to 20 and simple 2 number addition and subtraction sentences. This week we have used part-part-whole models, calculation walls and bead strings to visually support our learning.



In English we have started our new text 'Supertato' by Sue Hendra. To start our text off we needed to solve a crime – the evil pea had created a ketchup mess with our snack time fruit.* **This was not really the children's fruit but some I brought in from home.*

We then used our speaking and listening skills to act out scenes as different characters. We took this enthusiasm to then record questions remembering to correctly record a question mark.

Who did this? What is the red sticky sauce? Who will we call for help? Where is Supertato?

In phonics this week, we have learnt the following sounds please rehearse them at home:

wh – whip the whisk ph – photo on the phone ew – flew the crew oe – tiptoe past the doe

Please continue to read at home nightly and ensure reading folders are in school every day.

The highlight of the week was our 'Festival of Light' day where we focussed on the light festivals of Thailand.

The history books of Thailand tell us that at the time of the twelfth full moon, when the moon will appear at its fullest and brightest, this is the perfect time to 'make merit' and make a wish for good fortune in the New Year. During this time two festivals take place, Yi Ping and Loi Krathang.

The festival of Yi Ping is usually held at the end of November where paper lanterns are lit and released in to the sky to say goodbye to any misfortune and negative energy from the previous year. The release of the lanterns can be seen as an act of releasing your bad luck and mistakes into oblivion.

It is believed if you make a wish when you release your lantern it will come true in the New Year provided you do good deeds.

If your lantern disappears into the night sky before the candle burns out, it is said that you will have good luck, but if it crashes and burns your luck will be bad.

To help us make wishes, promise to do good deeds and for good luck in the coming year we made, glass jar lanterns, paper lanterns and a 'stained glass' picture of floating lanterns in the night sky.





The tradition of Loi Krathang, translates to floating boats. Small boats made from banana leaves and filled with flowers have a lit candle placed in them and are floated down the river as a way of saying thank you for all the good fortune in the previous year.






News from Yew Class

I hope that you all had a restful holiday last week and are gearing up for the lead up to Christmas now!

This week, in Maths, we have been continuing to look at addition and subtraction calculations as well as word problems associated with them. Ask your child how the below example is solved.



In English, we have almost finished our topic on the Boy in the Tower. Next week we will write our final piece linked to our work on the book.

In PE, this term, we will be playing rugby on the field in Friday's lessons. Please, therefore, could your child bring in a PE kit that they do not mind getting dirty if the weather deteriorates over the next few weeks. Thank you.

On Wednesday we, as a school, had our 'Festivals of Light 'Enrichment Day. In Year 5 we focussed on the Jesse Tree where we discussed some of the stories from the Old Testament and the messages that they convey. News from Oak Class

Welcome back after half term, we hope you all had a restful break.

We have started back this half term with a special R.E. day on Wednesday with the title 'Festivals of Light'. Each class took a different festival involving light from a variety of religions and investigated the way that these festivals are celebrated. In Year 6, we were allocated the study of Bible scripture focused on the word 'Light'. We took this opportunity to produce some artwork demonstrating our learning using stencilling and paint.

In Science, we have started a new topic 'Animals Including Humans'. This week we have set up another experiment that will run over the half term (exactly as our microorganism growth experiment did last half term) to investigate the impact of exercise on the functioning of the human body. If you have a moment, please ask your children to describe this experiment to you and perhaps share their predictions.

We have also been lucky enough to have a visit from Mr Sinden this week. He is a local Shackleton expert who came in to share details about his visit to the Antarctic with us. He was very knowledgeable and spent a great deal of time answering the questions that we had prepared for him.



In Geography we began our unit of learning on mountains. We located mountain ranges around the world and used geographical vocabulary to label the different features, eg, peak, summit, slope, base, valley etc We are looking forwarding to learning more about Mount Everest and Kilimanjaro in particular.



Year 6 have been helpful in plans for our Remembrance Day service next week where they will have a special role. They have enjoyed gathering donations for the Royal British Legion this week in the sale of poppies.
