



## Message from Mrs Daniels:

Children from Years 4, 5 and 6 proudly represented the school this week in the annual 'Quad Kids' competition, which involved over twenty local schools at the University Sports Ground in Cambridge. Children enjoyed making new friends and trying their best across the disciplines of sprinting, long distance running, throwing and long jumping. Our team did well to place sixth overall. Thank you to all the parents who helped transport children to and from the event. All the children thoroughly enjoyed the experience and were a credit to the school.



Mrs Morris led a moving whole school assembly on Thursday to recognise the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the D-Day landings, 6<sup>th</sup> June 1944. The children listened intently, with the aid of interactive maps and photographs, to details about how much of Europe was occupied by the axis powers and which parts of Europe allied forces were in control of. To try to explain the scale of the events of the time the children looked at a photograph of the O2 stadium which holds 20,000 people, the number of allied and axis forces that died on 6<sup>th</sup> June. Mrs Bowmer played the 'The Last Post' and the children listened respectfully during a time for reflection to remember the sacrifices that the soldiers and their families made. The children reflected that in their own lives, making the right choices is often difficult but it is important to stand up for what is right even though sometimes it might feel scary or difficult. 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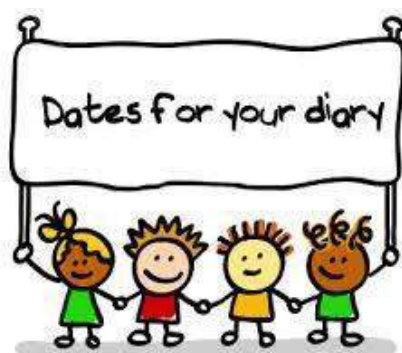

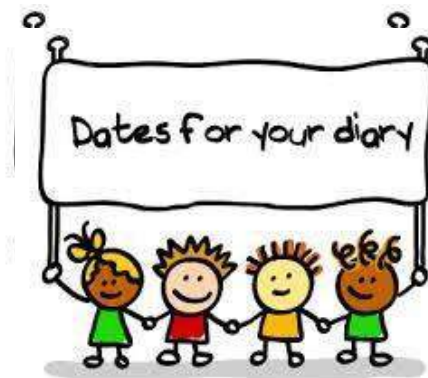

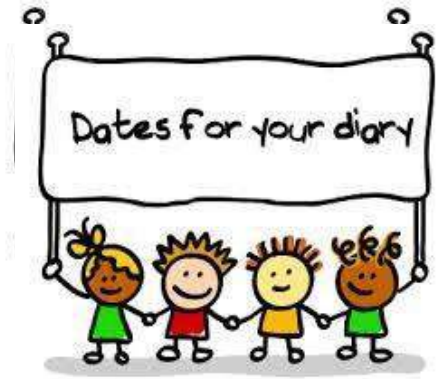

## Illness in School

If your child is absent from school, you must notify school by 9.30am of the reason for absence. If we haven't heard from you, we are obliged to investigate your child's absence.

Condition	Absent for
Chickenpox	Five days from the onset of rash and all the lesions have crusted over
Impetigo	Until lesions are crusted/healed or 48 hours after starting antibiotic treatment
Measles	4 days from onset of rash and once# recovered
Scarlet Fever	Exclude until 24 hours of appropriate antibiotic treatment completed
*Sickness and/or diar-	Until 48 hours after last episode of sick-ness/diarrhoea
Conjunctivitis	None
**Headlice	None
Mumps	5 days after onset of swelling
Tonsillitis	None

\* For sickness and/or diarrhea it is essential to keep your child away from school **until 48 hours after the last episode of diarrhoea/vomiting**. These sorts of bugs can be transmitted very easily, particularly in school settings. We do encourage lots of hand-washing in school and would ask you to follow this at home, as well. Please remember if your child is unwell they will be much more comfortable at home with a parent or carer who can look after them much more closely than we can in school.

## **Symptoms of respiratory infections, including COVID-19**

Respiratory infections can spread easily between people. It is important to be aware of symptoms so you can take action to reduce the risk of spreading your infection to other people.

The symptoms of COVID-19 and other respiratory infections are very similar. It is not possible to tell if you have COVID-19, flu or another respiratory infection based on symptoms alone. Most people with COVID-19 and other respiratory infections will have a relatively mild illness, especially if they have been vaccinated.

If you have symptoms of a respiratory infection, such as COVID-19, and you have a high temperature or you do not feel well enough to go to work or carry out normal activities, you are advised to try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people.

Symptoms of COVID-19, flu and common respiratory infections include:

- continuous cough
- high temperature, fever or chills
- loss of, or change in, your normal sense of taste or smell
- shortness of breath
- unexplained tiredness, lack of energy
- muscle aches or pains that are not due to exercise
- not wanting to eat or not feeling hungry
- headache that is unusual or longer lasting than usual
- sore throat, stuffy or runny nose
- diarrhoea, feeling sick or being sick

## News from Starling Class (Reception)

Hello from Starling Class!

We hope you had a restful half term. The children enjoyed coming back into school telling everyone about the adventures they had had. They also wrote sentences all about their half term adventures.

We began the week recapping the seasons we have previously learnt and then thought about what we already knew about Summer completing a class mind map. We read non-fiction books about Summer and then we wrote our own fact files using the facts we knew.



In Maths, we have been thinking about Shapes and how they are made up. We used 2D shapes to see if we could make other shapes, for example: two triangles can make a rectangle.

In Phonics we began our Phase 5 learning which included new sounds. The sounds we learnt this week were: ay, ou, ie, ea. These graphemes have been sent home for you to practise at home with your children.

We continued our 'word collecting' work this week with the following words below to build on our ambitious vocabulary.

Word	Meaning
Absurd	Something that is ridiculous or that does not make any sense
Essential	Something that is necessary or needed
Hindrance	A person or thing that makes it more difficult for you to do something
Distance	The length of space between two points or places

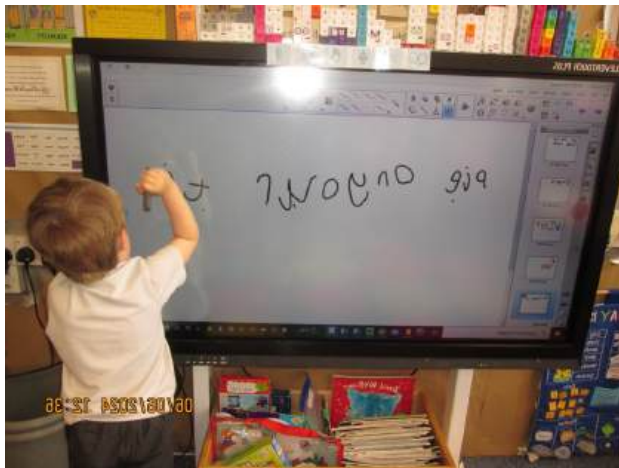


Next week we are going to be thinking about all the special men in our lives when we're learning about Father's Day.

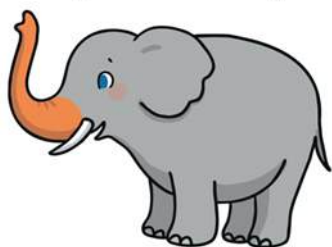
## News from Robin Class (Year 1)

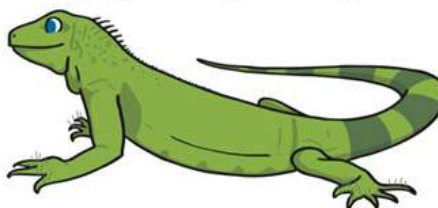

## News from Owl Class (Year 2)

Welcome back to the final half-term of Year 2, we hope you had a lovely half-term. It has been great reading about what you all got up to in the recounts that were written on Tuesday. It sounds like you had lots of fun and adventures.

In English, we have started our narrative topic, looking at all different types of fiction writing and the different genres that they fall into. We have had a look at the components of narrative and had a go at creating a simple story that we acted out with our peers.



In Maths, we have started our new topic of 'Time'. This week we have focused on o'clock, half past, quarter past and quarter to. We have enjoyed using the clocks and using our prior fraction knowledge to support us.

In PSHE, we completed a lesson about what is fair and unfair and whether we all have the same opinions about this, it was interesting to hear some different perspectives.



In our topic lesson, we started to look at what animals and plants depend on to survive in their different habitats and how often they both rely on each other for survival. Lots came up that surprised us and it really got us thinking about lots of different things, the discussions were fantastic.

In PE, we have started focusing on team games and earning points in order to prepare us for Sports Day, we loved having a bit of healthy competition.



The new spellings have been given out, the rule is: words ending in 'ey' that make the ee sound. The test will be on Monday 10<sup>th</sup> June.

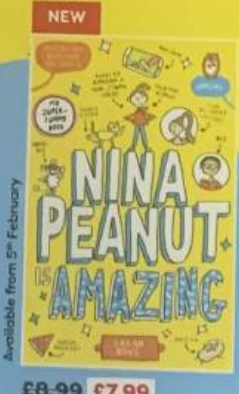
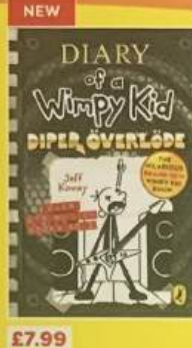
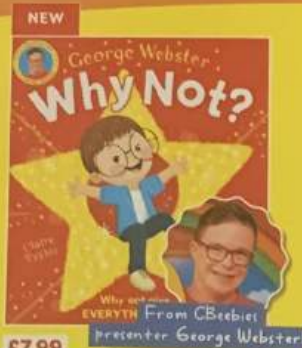

## News from Heron Class (Year 5)

### The Year 5 Team

Welcome back to school after the half term break. We hope that you all had a relaxing and peaceful holiday. The children certainly seem to be calm, rested, and ready to start on our last half term of learning together in Year 5.

In Maths, we have continued our work on shape using protractors to measure angles up to 180 degrees and to draw angles accurately ourselves. We have also used what we know about angles around a point and on a straight line to calculate the size of missing angles. The children seem to have enjoyed this work and everyone has made good progress. We have also taken another Tackling Tables test.

In English, we have finished our work on discussion texts and spent some time editing and improving our writing. Everyone completed their piece of writing by expressing their own personal opinion about whether or not they believe social media causes poor mental health, if you have time maybe you could ask your child for their opinion.

In Science, we have used our time this week exploring another irreversible change - the reaction of bicarbonate of soda with an acid. We discussed the heat given off during this reaction and identified the reaction as endothermic as the temperature difference was negative.



Finally, in R.E. this week we have continued to explore Hinduism. We have started with one of the most challenging ideas to understand - namely a sense of what Hindu ideas about God, the world and living beings are. We have begun to use the terms Atman and Brahm to try to explain these concepts.

This week we have been continuing to focus on our writing. The class finished writing their own auto-biographies at the end of last half term. There were some very honest accounts and some very readable anecdotes! We have now begun our next genre, where we will be focussing on an in-depth book study, leading to the children writing their own adventure story based on the book.

We will still be working on some mathematical activities this term, as it is important that the children keep the subject 'ticking over' in preparation for secondary school. We will focus on more open-ended problem solving exercises in particular. For example, this week we looked at problems associated with distances and travel.

Another area we will focus on will be PE – we will be partaking in athletics, cricket, rounders and OAA or Outdoor Adventurous Studies. More about that in a week or two.
