\* For sickness and/or diarrhea it is essential to keep your child away from school **until 48 hours after the last episode of diarrhoea/vomiting**. **Covid-19** - Current advice is that this should be treated as any other respiratory infection. The following is from <u>People with symptoms of a respiratory infection including COVID-19 - GOV.UK</u> (www.gov.uk)

#### Symptoms of respiratory infections, including COVID-19

Respiratory infections can spread easily between people. It is important to be aware of symptoms so you can take action to reduce the risk of spreading your infection to other people. The symptoms of COVID-19 and other respiratory infections are very similar. It is not possible to tell if you have COVID-19, flu or another respiratory infection based on symptoms alone. Most people with COVID-19 and other respiratory infections will have a relatively mild illness, especially if they have been vaccinated.

If you have symptoms of a respiratory infection, such as COVID-19, and you have a high temperature or you do not feel well enough to go to work or carry out normal activities, you are advised to try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people.

Symptoms of COVID-19, flu and common respiratory infections include:

- continuous cough
- high temperature, fever or chills
- loss of, or change in, your normal sense of taste or smell
- shortness of breath
- unexplained tiredness, lack of energy
- muscle aches or pains that are not due to exercise
- not wanting to eat or not feeling hungry
- headache that is unusual or longer lasting than usual
- sore throat, stuffy or runny nose
- diarrhoea, feeling sick or being sick

What a lovely week we have had. The children have been learning about Father's Day. We have enjoyed hearing all about the fun things the children do with the special men in their lives. We've heard about pancakes, pizzas, bike rides and camping!

In Maths, we have been thinking about capacity whilst thinking about the terms full, half full and empty. We predicted which containers could hold the most water and were surprised that the tallest container didn't always hold the most water. We also learnt that capacity could be anything, it didn't have to be water. We used cubes and paper clips to fill containers too.


# News from Robin Class (Year 1)

Day next Wednesday morning.






# News from Robin Class (Year 1)

## News from Owl Class (Year 2)

Another wet week at Steeple Morden but we have been lucky to still get a lot of time outside, the weather has not stopped our fun.



In English, we have continued our narrative topic by looking at a range of features that we have now started to include in our planning. We have been reading 'Somebody crunched Colin' and ordering the story using our time conjunctions.

In Maths, we have continued our topic of 'Time'. This week we have moved on to 5 minute intervals, counting forwards and backward in 5s. We have focused on whether the time is 'past' the hour or 'to' the hour.

Something that has come up a few times is the understanding of how we teach certain topics in Maths, this information is available on our Website (Information-Maths Curriculum) where you can see examples of Maths learning at our school.














## News from Swift Class (Year 4)



# News from Heron Class (Year 5)

We have had another busy week in Year 5. We have finished our discussion texts and begun to look at our next genre – explanation texts. We have looked at some examples of this type of writing and identified the common features. In preparation for our own writing, we have been working on using plural and possessive –s for singular nouns correctly. In spelling, we have focused on spelling words ending with the letter string –ough. These words are available on Spelling Frame for your child to practise at home.

In Maths, we have now finished our work on angles and moved onto a new topic – position and direction. This topic involves lots of work on co-ordinates; this is always a popular area of learning for the children as it involves using maps and following routes.

In Science, we have begun to investigate air and water resistance as part of our final topic – Forces. To investigate air resistance, we have made parachutes of various sizes and dropped them from the highest point on the play structure to see if we can articulate the link between the size of the parachute and the time taken to reach the ground.



Finally, in R.E. this week we have continued to explore Hinduism. We have spent time listening to the story of the six blind men and the elephant – a story that is used in many Eastern religions to explain tricky concepts. In this context in Hinduism, it is used to help explain the Hindu approach to ideas about God. Each man describes the part of the elephant that he can feel and interprets it as the whole. Hindus live with very

different ideas of God, but see each as part of something much bigger. Their understanding of God is defined as pluralism, rather than polytheism.

Using the book as a focus, we then drafted, wrote and edited an adventure story. We looked at different aspects of the story, from developing our story mountain in our planning, through to working on our dialogue and the different ways that we can show what a character's personality is like. The children loved reading Kensuke's Kingdom and were all very much engaged when doing so. Many of the class gave the book an 8, 9 or 10 out of 10. A resounding thumbs up from Puffins!



Shortly we will be focussing on our end of year production. We held auditions earlier in the week and the pupils will be given scripts for the roles that they will play.
