# **Young Carers**

As a school, we are looking to create a register of our Young Carers to raise awareness of these children amongst staff and look at ways we can further support them.

The NHS refers to a Young Carer as someone who 'looks after a relative with a disability, illness, mental health condition or drug or alcohol problem'. This could be supporting/caring for a parent or a sibling. A Young Carer may have to help prepare meals, make adjustments for someone with a disability, give medicine, translate or take care of your relative's hygiene.



There are more than 1800 young carers living in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough.

- Around two thirds of young carers look after a parent or both parents
- Around a third of young carers look after their brother or sister

# CLASSROOM HIGHLIGHTS

### **Acorn Class**

We have had a busy time settling back into school. In Maths the children have learnt all about numbers to 10, using and applying them and thinking about composition of number. The children have become experts at using ten frames to represent numbers and have begun to practise partitioning the numbers 5 and 10 with part whole models.

In Phonics the children have been working hard to expand their grapheme knowledge, The children have begun working on their listening and attention skills during whole class and group work time and recognizing and naming their emotions and acknowledging the impact that has on others and themselves.

Please can everyone bring PE kit in on Tuesday (joggers and jumpers too) and ensure your child is able to get into and out of their own clothes independently. We have had a lot of items go missing since our return after Christmas, so please check that everything is named with YOUR child's name.

### **Birch Class**

We have had an action packed couple of weeks in Birch Class. In our English lessons we have been creating our own tales, with a twist, based on the fable of the three little pigs. Children have kept the overall structure of the story but have changed characters around and added twists to the problems the characters encounter and how they are resolved.

We have been deepening our understanding of the concepts and language behind the process of division to develop our understanding. We are also relating division to multiplication so it is important your child keeps on with their practice of the multiplication table they are working on.

We are studying rivers of the world in our geography lessons and have been looking at the features of some of the main rivers in Africa, such as the Nile and Niger. In our language lessons we have been learning colours such as . The class is doing really well with recalling this language as they are picking up objects little and often and asking what colour this is and replying in mandarin.

Thank you to everyone who brought in their soils from home for us to compare pH and drainage rates in our Science lessons. We can reveal the soil in this areas is fairly natural – which is not the most exciting result so we introduced some vinegar to measure also!





**Ash Class** 

The Ash class highlight this week has been in our maths learning. We have developed our understanding of place value within 100 using part-part-whole models, place value charts and recording using expanded form. A tricky concept to understand but Ash class did very well.

Did you know 60 + 5 = 65 can also be recorded as 50 + 15 = 65, 40 + 25 = 65 and so on...



# CLASSROOM HIGHLIGHTS

## **Hazel Class**

In English we have started looking at the Anglo Saxon story of Beowulf which has so far led us to writing rather impressive descriptions of the setting and of the monster Grendel. The children seem to be captured by this ancient poem and the story it has to tell. Work related to Beowulf will continue until half term.

In Maths we have still been thinking about multiplication and division; we have been finding factor pairs, identifying perfect numbers and using our understanding of multiplication and division to find related facts. Work on this area of number will continue for the next two weeks.

In Science we have been thinking about and investigating states of matter.


Our history work has focused on the Anglo Saxons, Geography this term looks at rivers and our Art work focusses on the architecture of Ancient Rome.

### **Oak Class**

This week, Year 6 have been getting to grips with 'Arthur Spiderwick's Field Guide to Fantastical Creatures,' which has certainly generated some interesting discussion about the 'invisible world.' We were very excited to be the runners up in this week's Year 6 English Challenge heat and are hoping that we qualify for the final in April. Our four contestants were great ambassadors for the school and took on the challenge with a great deal of enthusiasm. Our members of the football team who were all geared up for today's tournament will be able to look forward to it being re-scheduled later in the term. Predicted gale force winds were to blame!







### **Yew Class**

In English we have finished our unit of work on the book 'Where the Forest Meets the Sea'. The final piece of work involved the children designing a persuasive leaflet about a favourite holiday destination or restaurant. Here are some examples below.

This week, in Maths, we have been continuing our work on fractions. We concentrated on adding and subtracting fractions. A key point to remember here is that when adding and subtracting fractions the denominator stays the same – it is the numerator that is changed. Knowing times tables is really crucial for the children here – please keep on learning these at home.
