^{*} For sickness and/or diarrhea it is essential to keep your child away from school **until 48 hours after the last episode of diarrhoea/vomiting**. These sorts of bugs can be transmitted very easily, particularly in school settings. We do encourage lots of hand-washing in school and would ask you to follow this at home, as well. Please remember if your child is unwell they will be much more comfortable at home with a parent or carer who can look after them much more closely than we can in school.

Covid-19 - Current advice is that this should be treated as any other respiratory infection. The following is from <u>People with symptoms of a respiratory infection including COVID-19 - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</u>

Symptoms of respiratory infections, including COVID-19

Respiratory infections can spread easily between people. It is important to be aware of symptoms so you can take action to reduce the risk of spreading your infection to other people. The symptoms of COVID-19 and other respiratory infections are very similar. It is not possible to tell if you have COVID-19, flu or another respiratory infection based on symptoms alone. Most people with COVID-19 and other respiratory infections will have a relatively mild illness, especially if they have been vaccinated.

If you have symptoms of a respiratory infection, such as COVID-19, and you have a high temperature or you do not feel well enough to go to work or carry out normal activities, you are advised to try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people.

Symptoms of COVID-19, flu and common respiratory infections include:

- continuous cough
- high temperature, fever or chills
- loss of, or change in, your normal sense of taste or smell
- shortness of breath
- unexplained tiredness, lack of energy
- muscle aches or pains that are not due to exercise
- not wanting to eat or not feeling hungry
- headache that is unusual or longer lasting than usual
- sore throat, stuffy or runny nose
- diarrhoea, feeling sick or being sick

News from Starling Class (Reception)

Hello from Starling Class!

This week we have continued to learn about minibeasts and on Monday afternoon we were able to enjoy the sunshine and go on a bug hunt around the school grounds. The children loved looking under the leaf litter and amongst the trees. We have continued to read Superworm by Julia Donaldson and building on our work from last week the children have written their own super minibeast story. We have been really impressed with their writing and how they have used their imaginations to think of their story and their phonics knowledge to help them with their spelling.

This week the children have used their art and design skills to create their own minibeast using lollipop sticks and other craft resources. They have also enjoyed playing minibeast charades, where the children had to move like their chosen minibeast and the rest of the class had to try and guess what they were.

In Maths, we continued to learn about sharing and halving numbers and this has led to the children learning about odd and even numbers.

In PE we had a carousel of activities so that the children could consolidate their learning from this half term. They practised their balancing skills, throwing and catching, and their agility.

We continued our 'word collecting' work this week with the following words below to build on our ambitious vocabulary.


News from Peacock Class (Year 3)


So over all a busy and enjoyable week.

News from Swift Class (Year 4)

In our History lessons we have been further exploring the Viking way of life – learning about what Vikings wore, ate and what they did for jobs. We have also been examining what evidence we have to know this is true. In our Geography lessons, we have been looking at sources of renewable and non-renewable energy which ties into our work on climate change. In our Science lessons we have been looking at food chains; identifying, predators, pray and producers.

For children who are not yet fluent with their times tables up to 12x12, we continue to focus on reinforcing their knowledge of the times table they are currently learning. It is essential for children to have a strong foundation in multiplication, as it serves as a fundamental building block for future mathematical concepts. Again, any assistance you can provide at home, such as practising times tables together or using online resources mentioned in the Star last week, will help your child with their future maths work. The government's multiplication tables check

will take place shortly after half term.

Our class panda has learnt to write 'I am a panda' from memory in mandarin!

News from Heron Class (Year 5)

We have had another busy week in Year 5 and have done our best to seize on any new opportunities for learning, often despite the weather!

In Maths, we have been working on angles. We have discussed understanding and using degrees, classifying angles (as obtuse, acute or right angles), estimating angles and using a protractor. Although using a protractor can be tricky to begin with, it is a useful skill required for maths in Year 6 and beyond and so we will persevere and practise until we are all feeling a little more confident.

In English, we have now finished assessing progress with the statutory spelling lists. We have had a huge range of levels of progress - ranging from none to scores increasing by more than thirty words since the last test. We are able to match those who have progressed clearly with those who have been undertaking their weekly Spelling Frame homework. Scores will be shared with the children early next week.

In Science, we have rounded up our experiment into asexual reproduction in plants by collecting our results and trying to interpret what they mean. We measured any growth in the plants that had been grown in sunlight, darkness and filtered light and looked for any patterns.

Finally, in P.E. this week we had a visitor from The South Cambridgeshire School Sports Partnership who trained those children who have volunteered to become our Play Leaders for next year when they are in Year 6. This is one of the responsibilities that Year 6 take on - supporting the younger children during lunchtimes to have happy and successful free-time by organising and running games that they can join in with.
