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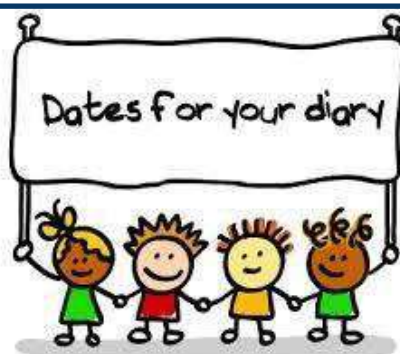

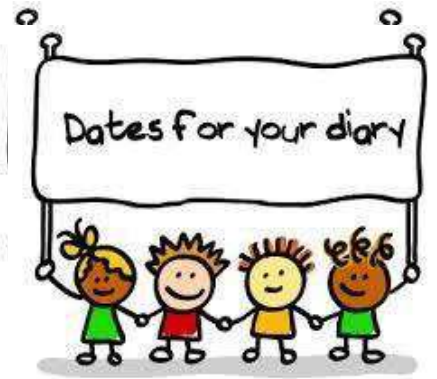

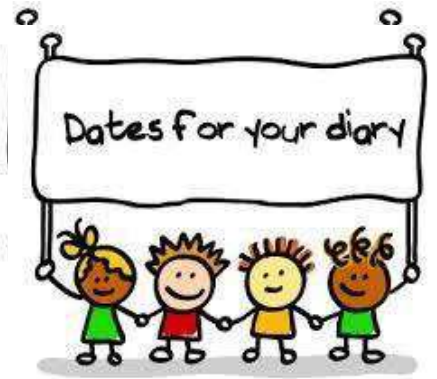

* For sickness and/or diarrhoea it is essential to keep your child away from school **until 48 hours after the last episode of diarrhoea/vomiting**. These sorts of bugs can be transmitted very easily, particularly in school settings. We do encourage lots of hand-washing in school and would ask you to follow this at home, as well. Please remember if your child is unwell they will be much more comfortable at home with a parent or carer who can look after them much more closely than we can in school.

Symptoms of respiratory infections, including COVID-19

Respiratory infections can spread easily between people. It is important to be aware of symptoms so you can take action to reduce the risk of spreading your infection to other people.

The symptoms of COVID-19 and other respiratory infections are very similar. It is not possible to tell if you have COVID-19, flu or another respiratory infection based on symptoms alone. Most people with COVID-19 and other respiratory infections will have a relatively mild illness, especially if they have been vaccinated.

If you have symptoms of a respiratory infection, such as COVID-19, and you have a high temperature or you do not feel well enough to go to work or carry out normal activities, you are advised to try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people.

Symptoms of COVID-19, flu and common respiratory infections include:

- continuous cough
- high temperature, fever or chills
- loss of, or change in, your normal sense of taste or smell
- shortness of breath
- unexplained tiredness, lack of energy
- muscle aches or pains that are not due to exercise
- not wanting to eat or not feeling hungry
- headache that is unusual or longer lasting than usual
- sore throat, stuffy or runny nose
- diarrhoea, feeling sick or being sick

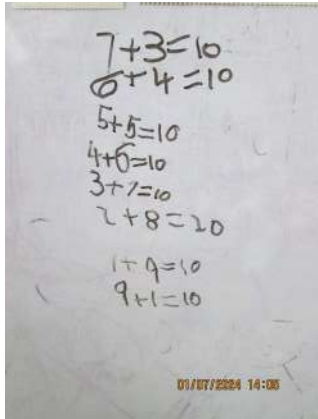

News from Starling Class (Reception)

We have been consolidating our learning about 'Under the Sea'. We have been really impressed with the children's knowledge and understanding all about the ocean. The children have been focussing on the story 'The Snail and the Whale' by Julia Donaldson. They have been sequencing the events and writing sentences describing the animals.



In Maths, we have revisited number bonds to 10 to ensure children really know these. They should be able to say "four and six make ten" with all the numbers up to ten. You could practise by saying a number and asking your child to say the 'partner number' to make ten.

In Phonics we reviewed our Phase 5 learning so far. We were really impressed with how much the children had remembered and recalled the phonemes we had learnt so far. This is partly because of all the practice you do at home so please keep it up!

In Art, we have been painting using shades of blue to show the layers of the ocean that we learnt about previously. In History, we learnt about David Attenborough and how he has helped to look after our planet. The children were fascinated by his work and enjoyed hearing him talk about sea creatures. We continued our 'word collecting' work this week with the following words below to build on our ambitious vocabulary.

Word	Meaning
Comfort	A feeling of being relaxed and pain free
Beckon	To make a gesture to instruct someone to approach or follow
Lamentable	When circumstances or conditions are very bad
Compassion	A feeling of sympathy for someone who is suffering
Feeble	To be weak because of age or illness

News from Robin Class (Year 1)

This week in Robin class we have been thinking about non-fiction texts. The children have all planned their own non-fiction page to write about frogs or butterflies, thinking about their headings and sub-headings. We are all very excited to start writing these next week.

We have come to the end of our unit learning about numbers to 100 in Maths this week. The children have really deepened their knowledge of these numbers, considering what each digit represents, how they can use whole-part models to show these, and comparing any 2-digit numbers, using the language of 'greater than' and 'less than'. They have also remembered to use the symbols $<$ for 'less than' and $>$ for 'greater than'. It is still a challenge for some to remember to 'read' the number sentence from left to right to ensure these symbols are the right way around!

We have also concluded our RE unit, thinking about the question, "Why do Jewish people say so many prayers and blessings?" by discussing what we have found out about Jewish people and when they say these prayers and blessings. We decided that Jewish people must say so many prayers and blessings because they have a lot to thank their God for.

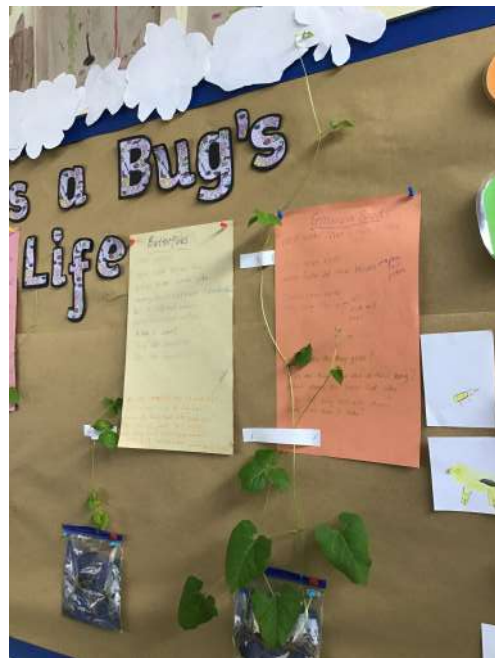

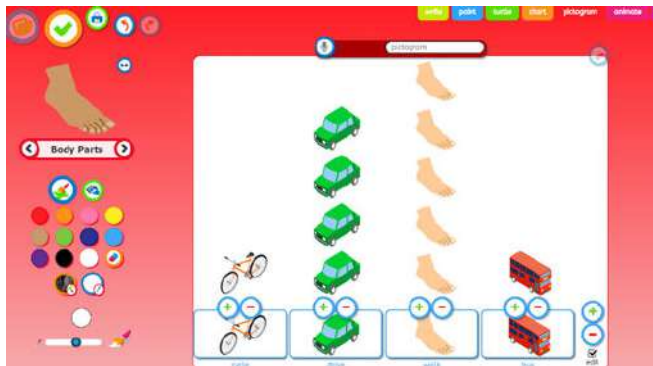
News from Owl Class (Year 2)

A busy week for the Owl children this week, performing poetry, describing movement, creating digital pictograms and thinking about how our responsibilities are changing as we get older.

In Maths we have started looking at position and direction and learnt lots of new vocabulary. Practice of using these words at home will really embed your child's learning.

In English we have started looking at a variety of styles of poetry. After watching clips of performance poetry by Benjamin Zephaniah we performed our own free verse poems. The children changed their pace, pitch and even added actions, it was great fun!

News from Peacock Class (Year 3)

This week's highlight was the walk to Ashwell.

In preparation for the walk and visit, we spent some time reminding ourselves about the facts we have gathered so far along our pathways through the past. There is evidence of a settlement in Ashwell from as far back as the Iron Age. We know this as archaeologists have found evidence and artefacts in the form of postholes, pottery remains, metalwork, and evidence of fires from domestic and early manufacturing. We were able to talk knowledgeably about these and how they would have been used by the Celts and the impact they had on the development of farming and daily life.

Jumping to the Tudors, we were able to talk about how and why houses were built and what they looked like. We could remember what show offs the Tudors were, given the chance, about how wealthy they were. We also discussed how superstition about spirits influenced their beliefs and lives. We listed what evidence we expected to find in Ashwell about its Tudor past.

Another leap through time found us in the 1940s. We expected evidence of Ashwell life in this time to be more plentiful; there may even be people to talk to that were actually there! We wrote a considerable list of what could be stored in the museum about this period.

The walk itself went very well, the weather was kind and we had lots of fun, although we were sure the school had been moved further away while we were in Ashwell, as the walk back seemed very long and much brisker than the walk there! While in Ashwell, we had a snack and play in the park, visited the museum, went in the church, had a walking tour of Ashwell, interviewed 'Ashlothians', had a picnic, and had a very enthusiastic paddle in the Springs, all before heading back to school for the end of the day.

I cannot imagine why anyone wouldn't have slept well on Tuesday night!

Back in the classroom, we have started work on creating a leaflet about Ashwell today; we are doing this in small groups so that we can share out all the work. This will form the basis of our work until the end of the year (I can hardly believe I have just written that last sentence, I do not know how we have reached this point of the year so very soon, time flying and fun!!)

News from Swift Class (Year 4)

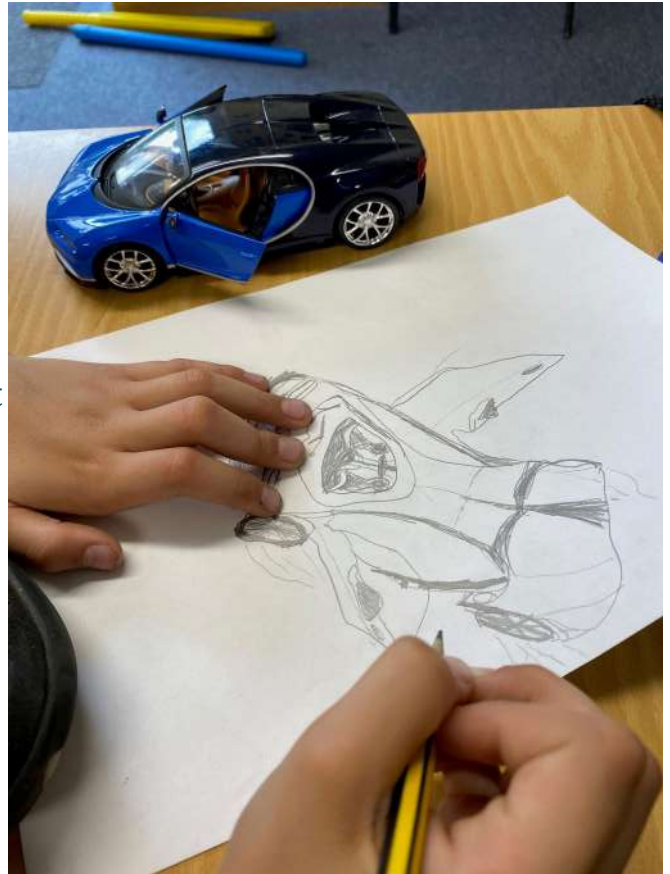
This week in our English work, we have been revising how speech can be constructed in texts so it is more interesting to read and we have been weaving together action dialogue and description to create narratives.

We will be opening a village foodbank in St Peter & St Paul Church from Monday 18th July

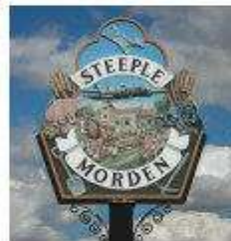
There will be Plastic boxes left in the porch of the church for people to leave their donations in or take required items.

As well as rehearsing for the production the students have continued with Art, Science, RE and Geography.

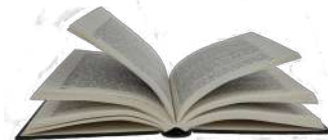
